TRANSIT CORRIDOR **PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT**

The BPW approved a request from the Maryland Transit Administration (MTA) to award two, five-year contracts for assistance with planning and project development for MTA's multimodal transit corridor projects. All awardees are firms based in Maryland. They will provide program management services, preliminary engineering, traffic and environmental planning, and more for several projects, including: Central Regional Transit Plan Corridors, Southern Maryland Rapid Transit, and the Red Line - a 14-mile East to West transit rail line serving Baltimore City and County.

HOWARD COMMUNITY COLLEGE



The BPW approved a request from **Maryland Higher Education Commission** to grant \$13 million in capital funding for the demolition of the existing Athletic and Fitness Center and construction of two new buildings to house the Mathematics and Athletics departments at Howard Community College. The new building complex will achieve a minimum of LEED Silver certification and will include sustainable features such as: high efficiency electrical and HVAC systems, stormwater management and a highly efficient means for removal and placement of site soils.

Summary Figures

The BPW approved 103 items, representing a total State expenditure of \$167 million including:

- 7 items awarding \$4.4 million to prime certified small businesses
- 2 items awarding \$1 million to prime minority business enterprises
- 8 items awarded with established participation goals for minority business enterprises
- 1 item awarding \$465,802 to **Employment Works Program providers**
- 5 items awarded with established participation goals for veteran-owned small business enterprises

SEXUAL ASSAULT EVIDENCE KIT TESTING



The BPW approved a request from the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention, Youth, and Victim Services to award STACS DNA (Ottawa, CN) a contract to provide an application to manage and track sexual assault evidence kits statewide.

After the passage of the Sexual Assault Victims Resource Act of 2017, the **Sexual Assault Evidence Kit Policy** and Funding Committee was created and identified several policy issues in this space, including inadequate tracking of sexual assault evidence from collection through testing and retention. The Committee applied for and received a federal grant which has been used to 1) inventory the State's backlog of untested sexual assault evidence, 2) test older kits, 3) develop a victim notification portal, and finally -4) procure a system to track evidence the item approved today.
